

2015/2016 TO BE A YEAR OF UNPLANNED PRESIDENTS PRO **TEMPORE**

Summer greetings everyone; I trust that you have been, and look forward to, enjoying outdoor opportunities for personal and family relaxation and celebrations.

You may be surprised to be reading another column over my signature; if so, you will not be aware that 2015/16 President John Evans resigned suddenly for medical reasons. Vice President and President-Elect Ron Britton and I have agreed to act in his stead as Presidents Pro Tempore - myself through the board's semiannual teleconference board meeting in October followed by Ron through our 2016 Halifax AGM at which time he will become President for 2016/17.

We will do our best to continue leading CSSE/SCIS in the wake of John's infectious enthusiasm and Newfoundland charm and wish him an early return to good health. In doing so, we welcome John's indication that he will observe, advise and opine in his capacity of Immediate Past President.

As John notes below while CSSE/SCIS President, John co-signed a letter in July to Canada's Premiers with Clem Bowman (on behalf of the Canadian Academy of Engineering) urging them to expand Canada's national energy grid as a critical component of their recently published Canadian Energy Strategy. Subsequently, Clem is active on several fronts including, importantly, our advocacy initiatives. Member Clem Bowman, assisted by Richard Marceau; Walter Petryschuk, Guy van Uytven and Ken Putt have forwarded a follow -up letter to Ontario Premier Wynne seeking funding to match the \$450,000 pledged by some 30 companies to undertake a two year study of three initiatives jointly with the Canadian Academy of Engineering: value-added upgrading of bitumen; expansion of low greenhouse gas electrical generation, transmission and trade; and reenergizing manufacturing around the energy industry. This initiative is being coordinated through the Bowman Centre at Western's Sarnia-Lambton Research Park (www.bowmancentre.ca) and is set for a September 1 media launch.

Additionally, CSSE/SCIS' Advocacy Committee is completing final editing of a position paper written by Dan Meneley with input from Don Peterson and Douglas Lightfoot which calls upon the federal government to adopt a proactive approach towards disclaiming current public fears over nuclear energy and highlighting the benefits to society of harnessing this energy source.

Our various chapters have programs lined up for their September restart of their monthly meeting cycles - if you haven't been an attendee, please note the listing details elsewhere in this newsletter and participate.

In closing, CSSE/SCIS needs to expand its membership. I have challenged each Board
