

INTRODUCTION

Since the establishment of the Canadian Society of Senior Engineers, the Montreal and Ottawa Branches have closely supported each other's activities often by direct local participation in meetings and initiatives resulting therefrom despite the physical distance between their residences. Happily, this mutually beneficial cooperation continues.

During recent years, the Montreal and Ottawa Branches have prepared reports regarding "infrastructure". The first report* was drafted by an advisory group consisting of five members of the Montreal Branch under the chairmanship of past CSSE-SCIS president **Jean-Guy René**. It was prepared in the broad context of Canada's national endeavors. The second report** was prepared by members from both Branches, again under the chairmanship of **Jean-Guy René**. It was specifically directed at the need for CSSE-SCIS members to reflect on our Society's existing governance, to assess and evaluate possible alternatives and to recommend actions needed to address the reality of the declining membership of our Society.

CSSE-SCIS membership has declined from 225 in 2012 to less than 150 in 2018 (still to be confirmed).

The Montreal and Montreal-Ottawa Branch reports have been set aside due to the action, or more correctly, the inaction of some directors and have gathered dust since, after delay, they were eventually distributed to Directors.

Fortunately, thanks to the initiative of president-elect **Suzelle Barrington** (Fellow 2015), to assist past president **Ron Britton** in preparing a report on the status of recommendations to restructure our Society's governance it is somewhat reassuring that members might be presented with some meaningful advice.

Tom became a member of our Society in 2000. He was elected a Fellow in 2011 and served as President of the Montreal Branch despite serious ill-health. **Tom** and his dear wife **Meena** regularly attended CSSE-SCIS AGM's across Canada. Their soft-spoken humor enriched our dinner meetings.

Dan and Millicent (Milli) Meneley retired to a lake-country home in Lakefield, Ontario, a four hour drive from Ottawa. Dan often drove to Ottawa to attend our meetings. In his field of expertise, Dan explained that the word unclear, with appropriate interchange of letters, becomes nuclear. He sought to explain the many benefits of the peaceful applications of nuclear energy, diagnostic and therapeutic nuclear medicine, low cost nuclear-electric power ... Vancouver Island Branch of the Member Societies of the Engineering Institute of Canada (including the Canadian Society of Senior Engineers) 2017/18 Branch Report

NOTE FROM THE CHAIR

During the fiscal year of 2017-2018 the Vancouver Island Branch (VIB) of the CSSE undertook a rebranding exercise to reach out to the next generation of senior engineers to develop a viable future for the society. As the legal name reflects the long history of this branch including the initial founding of the VIB EIC in the 1980's which also led to the formation the Scholarship Society of the VIB EIC and eventually joining with the CSSE to become the VIB EIC / CSSE. During this journey regular membership encompassed senior engineers from all these groups. In addition, a group of senior engineers also founded the UVic Engineering Associates which was an extension of the Engineering Faculty. This group provided a wide range of assistance to the Dean in the early stages of the engineering faculty. As the faculty grew rapidly the potential impact of this group was reduced and it eventually blended in with the VIB EIC / CSSE Branch. The scholarship society also retrenched and its oversight is the responsibility of the local branch along with the Victoria Foundation and UVic. To simplify all this it was decided to rebrand the local branch as the Vancouver Island Engineering Society (VIES) which reflects the mandate and role of the original EIC Branch. As such the By-Laws have not been changed significantly as they provide the scope to operate in the interest of all the founding groups.

Meetings:

On the first Friday of each month a Speakers Series lunch is held (Oct - May) at the Oak Bay Recreational Center averaging 40-50 attendees. This is significant as almost half of the attendees are new to the society in the past 2 years. In general we expect 25 continuing members, 10 new practicing engineers, 5 UVic faculty and students, 5 non-engineering guests. The December meeting is held in collaboration with the Victoria Chapter of EGBC and other meetings are partnered with EIC affiliates where possible. The speaker series is planned each spring with high level speaker of general interest to the engineering community.

Special events are planned 1-2 times per year, usually one with UVic. These tend to be separate from the monthly meeting and may be held at a separate venue. This year, Canadian astronaut Dr. **Bjarni Tryggvason** made a special presentation to the aerospace student clubs and had laboratory tours at UVic.

Speakers' Series

This year a speaker series was developed to broaden the reach of Chapter, an absolutely critical contribution in the long-term viability of the Society.

VIES has continued the tradition of organizing and judging Co-op report awards for engineering students. The Co-op Office nominates 5 - 8 papers which are adjudicated by 3 senior engineers. The awards are sponsored by CAMP 23 of the Corporation of Seven Wardens (Iron Ring) and the Victoria Chapter of IEEE. These awards recognize excellence in communications, professionalism and impact for the client. The students are recognized at one of our monthly meetings where they are presented with a plaque and award cheque for \$300. In addition, the Branch sponsors $2 \times $2,000$ annual scholarships to accomplished financially needy engineering students which are funded by our Endowment Fund at the Victoria Foundation together with ongoing contributions by our members directly to our Scholarship Fund at UVic. These scholarships are awarded to UVic engineering students who attended Vancouver Island secondary schools, have demonstrated academic excellence, enterprise and leadership but would benefit by the financial support. The winners are also recognized at one of our monthly meetings. These awards build personal contacts with senior engineers and our Branch.

To support this higher level of activity, VIES has created a website www.viengsoc.ca with the volunteer assistance of a UVic Engineering PhD student, **Babak Manouchehrinia**.
